The standoff over border wall funding that shut down the government recently lasted 34 days. If lawmakers cannot come to an agreement by February 15th, the government will shut down again. Over 10,000 Coloradan federal workers were affected (CNN), some here in the Arapahoe community, as Arapahoe students report.

"The parents [of a student's friends] didn't eat and their kids barely did. They had to take advantage of deals and people's help, as well as work out deals with the bank and companies on things like mortgages and bills being due."

February 14th marks the one-year anniversary of the school shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School which sparked a nationwide wave of activism. Many Arapahoe students participated in the April 14th walkout which advocated for stricter background checks control. Since then, there have been significant changes in firearm laws nationwide.

Notably, the Trump administration announced a new federal regulation banning bump stocks. Bump stocks gained attention after the Las Vegas Massacre and enable semi-automatic weapons to fire faster. Owners of the devices will have 90 days to turn in of destroy them. Gun rights groups, including Gun Owners of America have filed lawsuits opposing the decision.

Colorado lawmakers may also consider a "Red Flag" or "Extreme Risk Protection" law which would allow family members and law enforcement to request that guns be taken from someone who poses risk to themselves or others.
