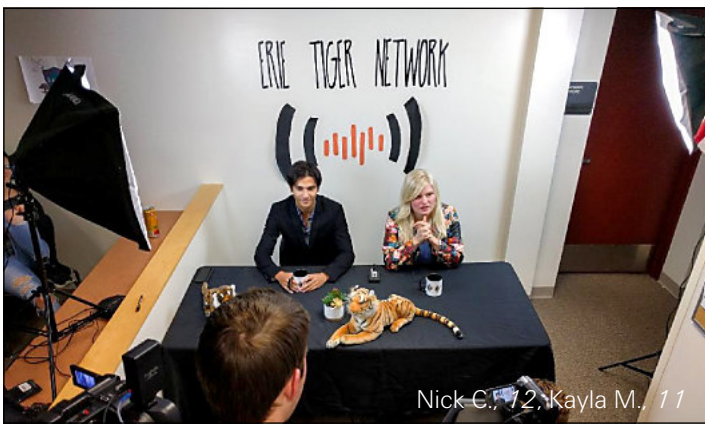


Live Streaming

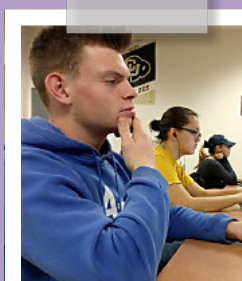

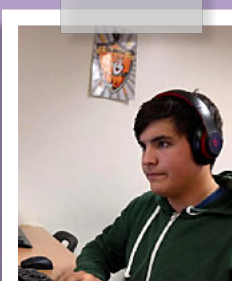
TIGER Times

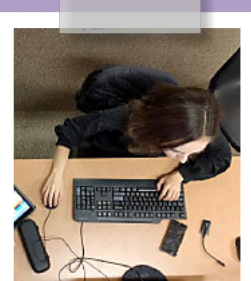
