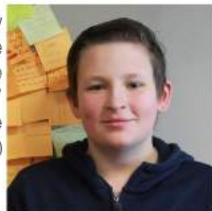
"I like it because we get to play a bunch of improv games, and we get to become a different person while you are still being yourself." Abigail Fletcher (8)
