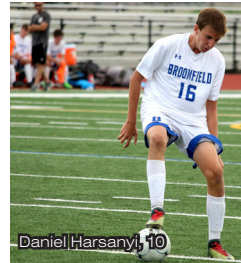

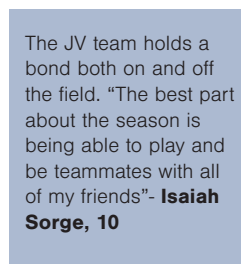
JUNIOR VARSITY

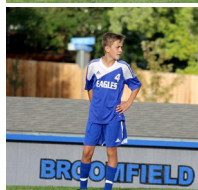
