January 2018

With the failing of the Mill Levy override in 2017, the District announced in the "27J District Educator" it was exploring moving to a four-day school week. Community forums were held for community members to share concerns and questions.

March 2018

27J Schools announced that the district would be moving to a fourday student contact week. New start times were included for secondary, 8:30 p.m. to 4:32 p.m. The funds would save money for new resources and retainment of teachers.

April 2018

The district made national news as "Good Morning America" and the "Today" shows debated the issue. On April 7, over 500 job-seeking teachers registered to come to the 27J Career Fair, with nearly 200 more on a waiting list. The year prior, there were only 200 who registered. The fair was covered on 9News that evening.

August 2018

Aug. 20, Superintendent Christopher Fiedler was interviewed on Fox Business Network. The next day, the community could pose questions to Fielder on a live Facebook interview from Kristen Chernosky of the City of Brighton 'Talk to Us Tuesday'' show.
