# THE AFTER EFFECTS OF ULMER

A day before bomb cyclone Ulmer, temperatures hit the upper sixties, and only four days after the storm, Daniels Gate's muddy trails glisten with already melting snow, which may come as no surprise to many with the bipolar weather of Colorado. The magnitude of the storm was proven through the closing of I-25 from Lone Tree to Monument, with many accidents and stranded cars along the way. Breaking records as the most intense cyclone ever recorded in the state, with wind gusts up to 80 mph in Denver and 97 mph in Colorado Springs, the dreaded blizzard, Ulmer, hit the bubble for two days straight. Students were snowed in March 13 and 14, the week before spring break, which meant the last two block days before break were replaced by an all-schedule Friday. "I was surprised we had two snow days and extremely mad because I'm missing the Monday after break, which means I have to remake three tests," Luke Smith '20 said. "Also, I studied for about four hours for a test that will now be about three weeks from now so I'm pissed."

The sixteenth volume of the *Black & Gold* yearbook was produced during second and fourth COVER, ENDSHEETS & PAPER period in the 4113 yearbook lab at Rock Canyon High School in Highlands Ranch, CO. It was printed by Balfour Publishing in Dallas, TX. Rob Rathbun was our Publishing Representative and Robert Porter was our Account Executive.

# **THEME & DESIGN**

Throughout upwards of seven theme ideas for this year's book, one goal stayed the same. We wanted a "spirit book." A book that encompassed everyone from the Golden Boys to the marching band. While trying to create a phrase to encapsulate these ideas, we got tripped up on the actual theme. What started as "Brave, Bold, Black & Gold," transformed into "Ours" and finally became YOU UNITED. When discussing the theme with Judi Coolidge, we wanted to reflect the infamous unity and spirit

of our school while still addressing the reality of **OUR SWEET (VOL.) 16** of our school While still addressing the reality of division. Cover material is Bustram Lustre-wicked with a white silkscreen mixed with UV and a black 910 silkscreen with gold foil. The binding features black and gold headbands. The endsheets have soft touch lamination otherwise coated one side stock. C1S white with Black printing. The 344 pages of the BLACK & GOLD are printed in full color on 100# Polar Bear Matte paper.

# **TYPOGRAPHY & COLOR**

All body copy was set in Frutiger 45 Light. All headlines were set in **BISON BOLD** with varying sizes, and subheads were set in BISON REGULAR. Lead-ins were **BISON BOLD**. Editors believed that having a coverage driven book allowed content to be broad and flexible The Black & Gold used primary-colored pulled color from singular photos on each spread. Out of the total 1,850 yearbooks, 1,650 were sold during pre-sales at a cost of \$75 before Jan. 1. The remaining amount were sold on a first -come, first-served basis at \$100. Senior ads were sold through The Yearbook Company. 1/8 page ads were sold in 67 \$75, 1/4 page ads for \$105, 1/2 page ads for \$175, and full page ads for \$300 before the early-deadline of Oct. 5. **PHOTOGRAPHY & PORTRAITS** 

Staff photographers used Nikon DSLR cameras. Photographs were edited and prepared for submission using Adobe Photoshop and Lightroom CC 2017. Underclass and faculty portraits and most sports team were taken by Lifetouch Photography. Senior portraits were provided by Vision Photography at their studio and at school for free to all seniors.
