











A Quinceanera is a celebration of a young girl coming of age and transitioning into a young woman. She is now leaving her childhood and beginning her adulthood. It is an important part of Hispanic culture, and there are some important traditions that follow along with a Quinceanera. The gown worn by the Quinceanera is often compared to a wedding dress. It is traditionally a large tulle based dress that represents the girl based on the style of the dress. The dress design demonstrates that the Quinceanera girl is no longer a young girl, but is now a young vibrant woman. It starts with the ceremony traditionally at a church,

where a Bible is given. The priest or pastor indicates it, then he talks about the importance of the word of God in a Quinceanera's life. After the ceremony, the Quinceanera will be crowned. The crown symbolizes a "princess" before God and the world; a triumph over childhood and the ability to face the challenges ahead. Once the crowning is done the Quinceanera performs "The Last Doll." It is a dance performed usually by the Quinceanera and a younger sister. The performance symbolizes that she will now be leaving her childhood and passing it onto her younger sister, and that the Quinceanera will be focusing on her future. "The changing of the shoe" is a symbol of growing and maturing. The Quinceanera usually wears a flat shoe, representing a child, and then the father comes forth and exchanges the flat for a heel. A heel representing womanhood and adulthood. Lastly, a toast is given by a family member which closes the ceremony. During the toast, the family member will share all the memories they have about the Quinceanera and the achievements she has accomplished. While a Quinceanera celebration may seem largely extravagant, it has a lot of deep symbolism behind it. It is about reaching a point in life where you are no longer a child, but a young independent woman.


