

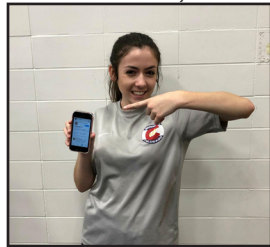

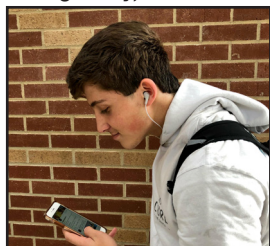

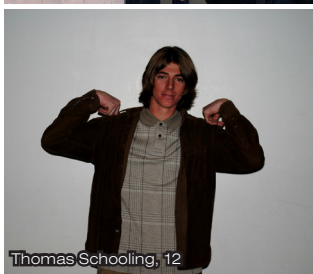
"Dressing up and looking neat makes me feel good about myself. I like to keep myself together and be presentable so that I can be confident and make it easier for people to approach me."

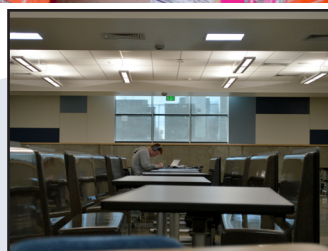
