The varsity football team makes it into playoffs, but a loss in the second round against Cherry Creek brings their season to an end.

As the 2018 season came to a close, the varsity football team ended the year stronger than ever before.

"Making it to the playoffs was a huge accomplishment. Not every team plays into November and it's a special feeling. Everything changed, the culture in particular. Every player and coach bought into the program to make it successful," Cole Oster '19 said.

The team ended the season with a state ranking of 24, better than they had done since 2011. Many players believed the change happened because of the overall team effort.

"It really took a lot of work from our players to our coaching staff. A huge mindset change was in place from 'being hopeful to win' to 'winning is the expectation.' That really helped us all out," Ryan Joas '19 said. "We also played really smart and tough football, so that was a change from last year."

The 5A varsity football team went into playoffs following their 7-3 regular season. In the first round of playoffs they beat Fountain Fort Carson 35 to 20.

"Winning against Fountain Fort Carson

was really something special to all of us because that had been our first home playoff game in a long time and it was special to be a part of the team that made the accomplishment," Joas said.

After the win, the team knew they needed to get ready for their next competitor: Cherry Creek High School.

"After we won against Fountain Fort Carson, I felt like we were ready to play with the big dogs," Mark Kyrimis '19 said. "I was ready to move to the next week and prove that we are here to stay."

In an abrupt end to the season, the team lost to Cherry Creek 41-14.

"My overall thoughts on the season are that it went well, but it didn't go well enough. I was happy that we played as well as we did, but I wanted to win more and go further into the playoffs. It was an accomplishment but there was more we could've done to make it better," Kyrimis said.

For a team that hadn't carried great records in previous seasons, they made it further than anyone had expected.

"We accomplished what no one thought we could and that's a special feeling," Oster said.
