how the COVID-19 outbreak impacted our daily lives

If a senior like Ethan Hanson was asked at the beginning of the year to predict what the year would have held, a likely answer would have included enjoying his last sport seasons in high school, spending time with old friends before scattering around the country for college, and finally getting a turn to get involved with senior traditions that he had looked forward to for four years. Instead, Hanson, along with students around the country, spent the weeks following spring break at home, doing schoolwork online and staying home to slow the spread of COVID-19. "It's really sad," shared Hanson, a varsity lacrosse player. "I always had an image of what my senior season would look like, or what capstone newspaper stories I might write in the last few months, or just saying goodbye at graduation, grad parties, that whole start of summer celebration." But for Hanson and his classmates, those milestones never came; it was announced on April 3rd that inperson classes would not be resuming for the remainder of the semester, following an extended two week spring break and a week of online classes. Many students, seniors and underclassmen alike, found this news extremely disappointing. Junior Sofia Wasson shared, "I was really sad

because I won't be able to say goodbye to my senior friends before they leave."

Amidst the sadness and disappointment, students were forced into a time of confusion and new normals. Stay-at-home orders were issued, preventing them from seeing their friends, and the CDC asked that people practice social distancing maintaining a distance of six feet from one another. In a time when students needed each other the most, they were unable to be together. Not only were seniors accepting the loss of their final few weeks of childhood, but many also mourned the loss of a close friend. "Losing a friend is already such a hard experience," shared Zada Edgerly (12). "The current situation with the virus made it so much harder because the only way to really make yourself feel better is to be surrounded by people who loved them as well, and not being able to do that definitely made the healing process harder." Despite the challenges of grief, the Littleton community found ways to become unified and support one another as they always had.
