A social studies and history high school teacher, he was always enthusiastic when teaching.


Trevor Presson, 11th, remembered his positive attitude. "He always seemed fun and chill, and excited to be there," he said. "He was so genuine."

Gilbert made a large impact on the PGA community, always smiling and talking with the students and staff around him, including junior Tobi Miller. "To this day I still miss him," he said. "He didn't care if you were different. He was one of a kind, and no one could replace him."

Gilbert's mentor teacher Mr. James thought back on their first encounter. "He came in for an interview with me for student teaching in November of last year," Mr. James said. "I remember thinking, 'Oh wow, he looks very punk rock.' He had an air of confidence about him, and I could tell he would connect with students, especially at PGA."

Gilbert will be greatly missed by his family, friends, and students, but will always be remembered. At the celebration of life held at Avogadro's Number, I had the opportunity to share that he made an impact on me, even when he was only at the school for a semester. When Mr. James informed my class that we were going to have a student teacher, I remember being worried. But that was before we all met Mr. Gilbert. Right after our first conversation, I had a feeling that I wouldn't want to say goodbye to him. And I was right. I will never forget him.

InhonorofMr. Gilbert's "devotion to his students, especially those following a challenging or non-traditional path," a memorial fund has been established by the Gilbert family. Mr. Gilbert's confident and kind energy, and a touch of punk rock, will be left behind. But it will be the passion & personal connections that made him a great friend and teacher.
