"A part of me felt like I was letting them down, but I know it wasn't my fault. I knew it was only a minor setback for a major comeback," Bynum said. His teammates were right beside him and just

Bynum sat on the sidelines being a part of the team, without actually playing. "I talked to the team each game after I was hurt. I let them know that I would do anything to be out on the field for them, so they should go give everything they have because I no longer could," Bynum said.

His team as well as his family have been his biggest supporters, not only through his injury, but during his whole career. Along with the awards the football teams have earned and the memories the school holds of him, another one of his legacies is his younger brother, Rylan Bynum.
