WITHOUT PRIDE DAY. The annual event took place, yet with creative modifications.

"We worked hard to create a PRIDE experience that still focused on this goal. However, because of COVID protocols, we changed the format of the Activity Day in August by dividing the sixth graders into smaller groups made up of three sixth grade CORE Plus classes. The smaller groups came separately and this allowed us to socially distance within the individual groups and also between the PRIDE groups," PRIDE Sponsor Kendy Blake said.

Instead of touring the building and assisting sixth graders with their lockers, the PRIDE Leaders provided guidance in alternative ways.

"Because the incoming sixth graders could not tour the school before coming on the first day, the PRIDE Leaders created a video tour and neon green signs were hung around the school to help them find their classes," Blake said. "The PRIDE Leaders also created a video showing organizational strategies for school supplies and backpacks for in-person learning days and a video with strategies for the sixth graders to use on distance learning days."
