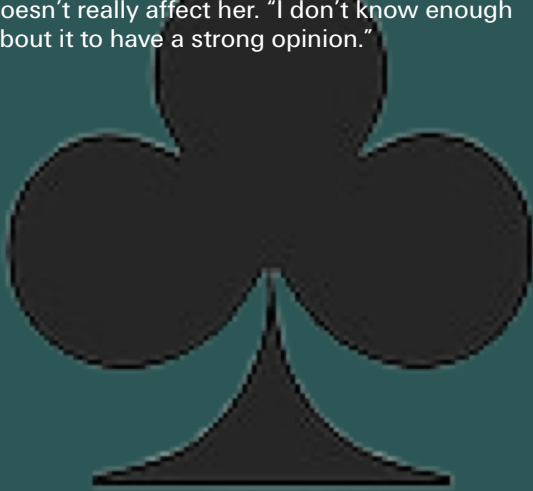


2020 Debates

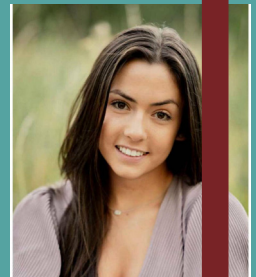
