The high school is able to provide numerous opportunities not offered throughout the rest of the valley.

The high school offers duel enrollment classes from both the Trinidad State Junior College and Adams State University.

Being located near both campuses, students have the opportunity to take in person classes on the college campus or at

There are requirements to being able to take courses through these colleges.

When the courses desired to be taken include subjects such as math or writing students must first reach a certain score in a placement test or their SAT.

The score needed will be discussed prior to the tests. The high school will pay for tuition fees for both the courses taken at Adams State University and

Trinidad State Junior College through a grant available to the high school.

The fees that the school does not cover are books that are required for the course along with any other materials that are a necessity for the

Councilors at Alamosa High School will assist students in renting or buying any books or materials.

Students must pass their classes with a C average which is anywhere from a 70% through a 79%.

The failure to pass any courses with this grade leads to the tuition fees becoming the responsibility of the student and the student's family.

Prior to being enrolled into any and all duel enrollment courses students and guardians must sign a contract.

The Contract states that they understand that failure to pass the class will led to them having to pay for the course. Parents are also responsible for providing all needed materials.

It is encouraged for students to utilize this opportunity to gain college credits and to further their education.
