Here's the goal. Every sophomore has a chance to complete the Personal Project and earn their Middle Years Programme (MYP) diploma. MYP is the IB course load that all freshmen and sophomore students take. Participating in the Personal Project gives students a chance to explore their interests outside of the MYP academic courses. Breeana Tran '24 and Ghislane Rodriguez '24 teamed up to choreograph dances to K-pop songs for their project. "We would go to Breeana's basement and examine the dances that we wanted to learn, and then we just practiced each step bit by bit until we got it down, and then we practiced the full thing," said Rodriguez. "Performing was really fun, especially when we know the dances and we can feel that we're both doing it correctly. It's definitely a really good moment," said Tran. The Personal Project gives students the opportunity to explore their interests, learn new things, and showcase their experience at the end of their presentation.
