The Calm Room opened last school year but had limited capacity due to Covid restrictions.

"This project was a passion of mine because I know that high school can be overwhelming and over stimulating for many kids. I'm so glad that we have a space for our students to take a break in a safe environment. How can kids learn if they aren't regulated? I have found that it has been helpful to so many students, and I am proud to have been a part of making this thought a reality for our school," Jolene Shedeed counselor, said.

WALKING THROUGH THE HALLS WERE BUBBA AND GUS, two therapy dogs owned by counselor Ryan Sullivan. They had been therapy dogs for three years.

"We walk through the halls and visit classrooms almost every day and hear and see all the smiles and joy that people get when they get to see and say hi to Gus or Bubba. I think they make the school atmosphere feel more welcoming and less tense. 
This was the scenario participants had to work as a team to find clues and solve puzzles in order to prevail at the


AROUND 2011, THE BRIGHTON ARMORY WAS TRANSFORMED INTO AN ARTS CENTER FOR THE
