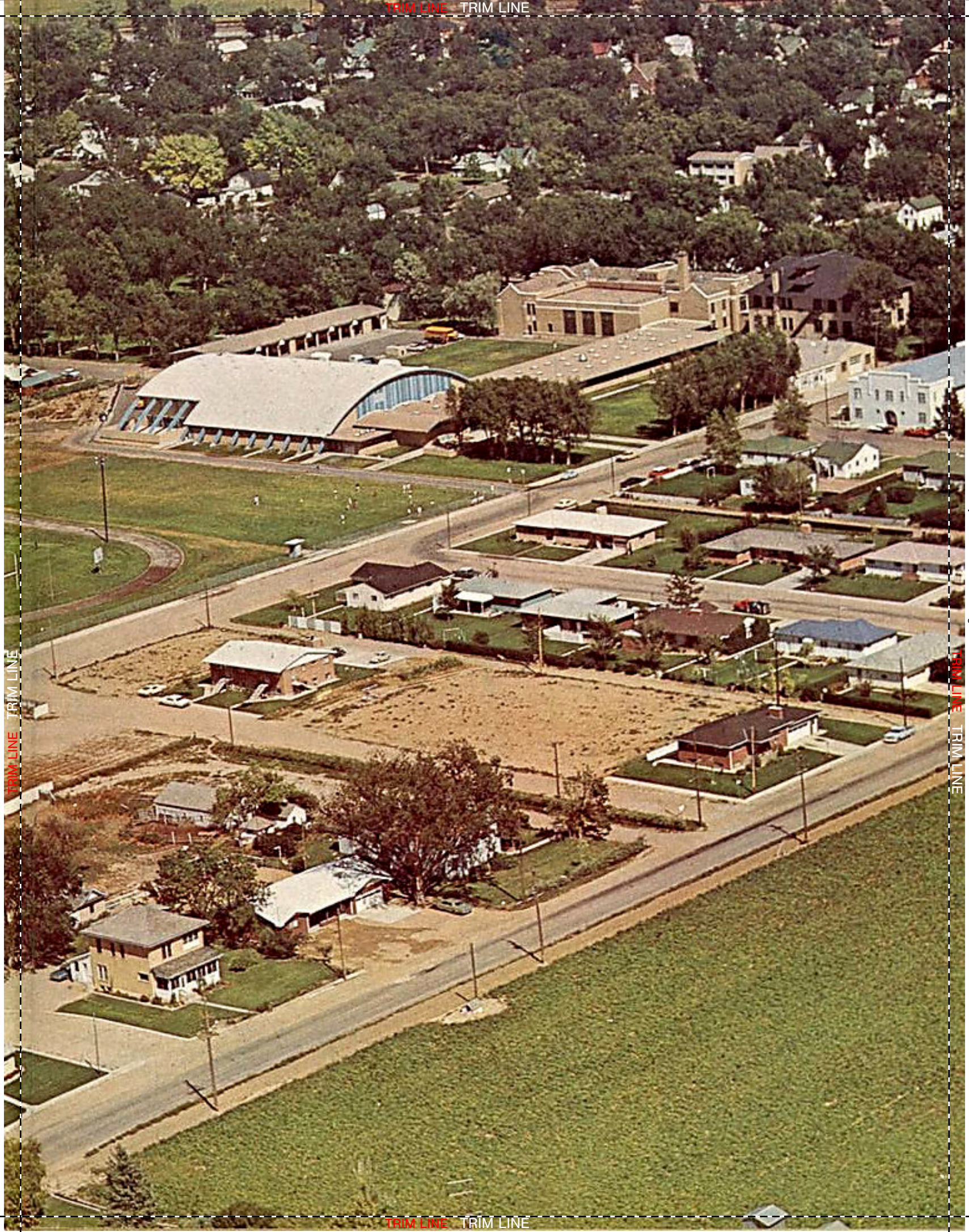

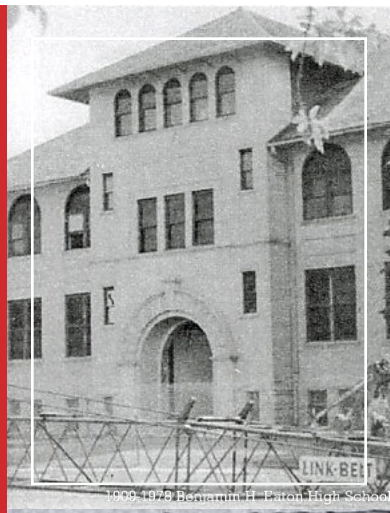

## DID YOU KNOW?

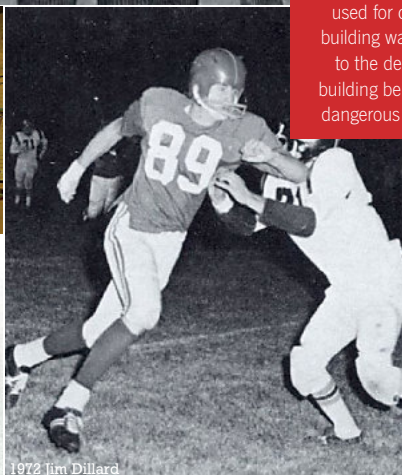
For many years, there has been speculations at Eaton High School about paranormal activity in the '28 building, but some people are unaware that a terrible tragedy actually occurred resulting in these conspiracies. In 1922, former science teacher Miss Elizabeth Gault was in a horrific accident. An explosion from fumes and chemicals in a science lab resulted in brutal burns all over her body, causing her to pass away later that afternoon at the hospital in Greeley. This accident occurred in the old Benjamin H. Eaton High School that was built in 1909. The science lab where the explosion took place, remained closed while other parts of the building were used for classrooms and the cafeteria. The building was finally demolished in 1978 due to the destruction of the explosion and the building being too old to be repaired and too dangerous to be used by students and staff.



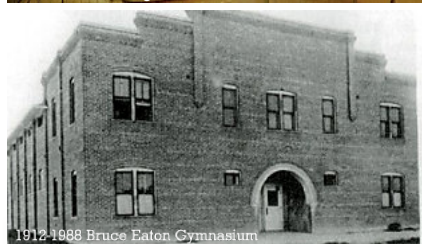

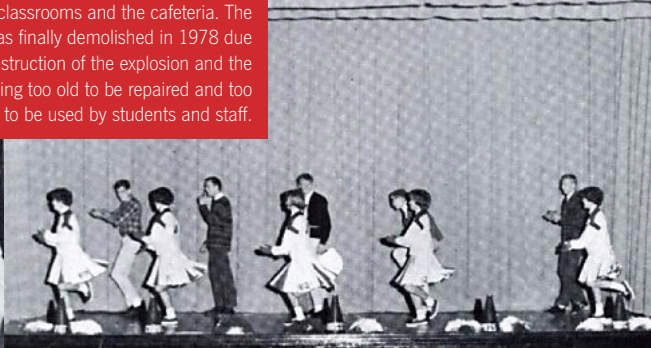

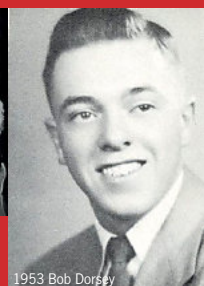

# OUR LEGACY

In the fall of 1897, Eaton High School was established, and the first high school building was built in 1909. This school was named after the founder of Eaton and was known as Benjamin H. Eaton High School. The town of Eaton continued to grow, causing the school to overflow and need more room. This expansion resulted in the construction of the 1928 school building which is now known by current students as the '28 building. In the following 60 years, more additions were added to the high school. The commons and science hallway were built in 1962, and the old library, choir room, weight room, wrestling room, and aux gym were added in 1988. Almost a century after the '28 building was built, the little town of Eaton has continued to grow and the school is in need of another expansion. Citizens of Eaton voted and the bond to build a brand new high school was approved in November 2019. The planning of the new school started in January 2020, and the ground breaking was a year later in January 2021. Since then, construction on the new high school, as well as construction on renovating the existing high school into a new middle school, has been in full force. Throughout all of these changes and new additions to Eaton High School, legacies have been made and the Class of 2022 will be the last class to graduate from our historic building. Generations of Eaton Reds will close the final chapter of Eaton High School at its current location for the past 113 years. All of the good things Eaton High School has accomplished and all of its victories throughout the years, all come together to make Eaton High School what it is today and contribute to what it will become in the future in a new school building.

The shield for Eaton High School was established in 1926 and designed by Halcyon Gillies. In the fall of 1925, Gillies entered a statewide contest and created this shield and banner to depict her conception of school spirit. She won the contest and was awarded a full ride scholarship to what is now known as the University of Northern Colorado. Her art was later designed as a bronze plaque and was made a permanent statement for what Eaton High School stands for, with each symbol on the shield representing a different meaning. The **crossed flags** represent **solidarity, fair play, honor, and courage**. The **lamp of learning** represents **power of knowledge**. The **handshake** represents **sportsmanship, honor, integrity, and trust**. The **trophy** represents **engaging in the other principles on the shield and rewards for achievements**. All of the attributes on the shield are what Eaton High School strives to achieve and celebrate.

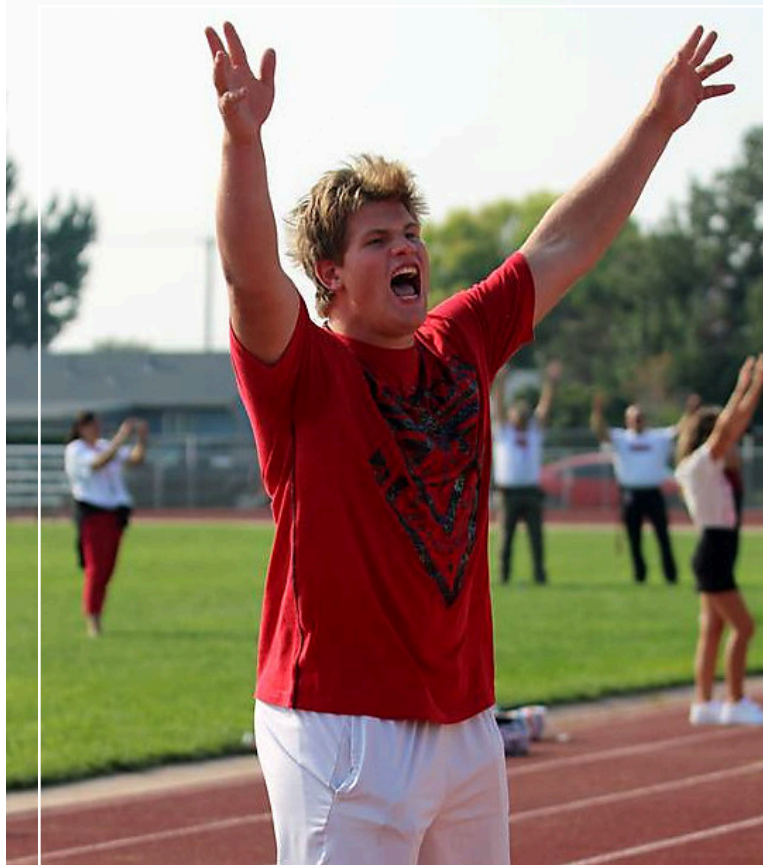
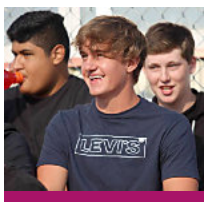
## REDS Riled Up!
