

OUR PRIDE

GSA stands for Gay Straight Alliance. This club is for students who want to support others within the LGBTQ community. In the club, one of the topics commonly discussed is the mental health within the community. Some people in the community deal with mental health struggles because they are trying to figure out their identity along with the lack of acceptance of their identity. Club president Feliz Martinez said, "We talk a lot about mental health and how that affects LGBTQ teens or young adults in the community and how using pronouns and getting support is needed for students trying to figure out who they are." Some statistics provided by the Trevor Project showed that 42% of LGBTQ youth seriously considered suicide in the past year and 72% of LGBTQ youth reported symptoms of generalized anxiety disorder. The mental health struggles could be caused by the lack of support in their homes and at school. Another statistic showed only 1 in 3 LGBTQ youth found their home accepting. GSA is a place where students in the community can find support whether they lack it in other areas or not.
