Restaging the Lion King, the cast makes unforgettable connections. Story by Sadie Weborg and Ella Engle

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The lights dim; the only sounds come from the audience in hushed whispers. In the silence of anticipation, she takes a few steps into the darkness. Feeling the prickles of sweat and the stirring of butterflies in her stomach, she mentally repeats her lines over and over. All that is left to do is to take a deep breath and trust. It is time to shine. "I was very nervous because I had only ever practiced in front of the cast. Then, during opening night, everyone, including my friends, were there watching," Stella Eames (8), who played Rafiki in the production of The Lion King, said.

Holding hands, heads together, Ezra Tingue (8), Azariah Rohrs (8), and Sadie Weborg (7) did a chant before going on stage. "Every time," said Rohrs, "it just made going on so much easier knowing that we were all friends." On the other side of the stage, the ensemble raced to get their props. "It was vital to stay calm," Bailey Williams (6) said. "We had about five minutes to switch costumes throughout the show."

From auditions to closing night, The Lion King wasn't always a smooth ride. In 2019, the show came to a heartbreaking end due to COVID school closures. "It was one of the most heart-wrenching things that has EVER happened in my teaching career," said director Laurel Wicke. "After all that work, we felt we had to restage it, but it wasn't easy."

Even for returner Ahna Smith (8) who was in the original 2019 cast, the first rehearsal gave her pause. "I felt that the first rehearsal was pretty hectic," Smith said. "I wasn't sure how this would work with so many people." With double casts, ensemble, and chorus, the total cast numbered a whopping 78 students with another 20 crew members.

The rehearsal process, while a lot of work, brought happy memories and inside jokes. Natalie Cowgill (8) said, "I remember when Nora was singing 'Shadowlands', and this time she skipped over Bella to hug me first. The look on Bella's face was priceless. We all fell on the ground laughing."

Even though the show was amazing, the things that went on backstage were almost even better. "When Shadowlands came on, I looked across the stage and on the other side, Tate (Simba) was singing and dancing his heart out," Moriyah Martin (7) said. "It was almost my favorite part of the show."

The stage crew, those that put the whole show into motion behind the scenes, had the most weight on their shoulders. Elle Molinaro (8) who controlled the lights said, "One mess up could ruin the whole show. It put a lot of pressure on me."

After not being performed in 2019 to a show stopper in 2021, The Lion King was truly an iconic performance. When the lights dimmed for the final time, the cast couldn't help but hug each other. "I walked back into the auditorium at the end," Wicke recalled, "and every single cast member was on stage singing one last time in an empty auditorium. I'll never forget it." Added Roen Casari (8), "The Lion King will always be a part of me."
