AS THE BOYS TENNIS TEAM WATCHED the University High School team enter the tennis court at Riverdale Ridge on Sept. 15, they were determined to win, according to Jake Halverson '22. The team had lost their four prior tournaments, so captains Halverson and Ryan O'Callaghan '22 had players focus on their specific goals and skills to be ready to face the team. The tournament ended with the combined team beating University 4-3.

From then on the boys continued to win matches against teams like Mountain View and Severence. In the Windsor tournament, Halverson and his partner, Peyton Miller '22, were tied in sets against their opponents from Greeley West.

"We were in the finals of the tournament and we were playing for first place. We

THE INCIDENT
Toward the last 15 minutes of second period on Oct. 6, the fire alarm went off causing the high school to evacuate to the football field. A fire set in the boys bathroom on the southside of campus set the alarms off and sprinklers to go off in two classrooms.

Once the fire department cleared the fire, it was announced that school was canceled for the rest of the day and all belongings would have to be picked up in the morning.

STUDENT REACTION
"All of a sudden, the fire alarm just went off. I was really annoyed at first because I hate doing fire drills, especially when it's cold outside. Once I went to the hallway outside my classroom and saw smoke coming from the boys bathroom, I knew it wasn't a drill. It was actually pretty scary because my classroom was right outside of the bathroom where the fire was," Shawn Tiffany '22 said.

TEACHER REACTION
"I sighed because AP Physics was being interrupted. Then, as I grabbed the go-kit, someone close to the door said, 'There's smoke!' I wasn't the first to the door. Kids were already leaving. As I saw the smoke billowing out of the door, I was encouraging my students to get a move on saying, 'Actual fire, actual fire, let's go!' I checked that my room was empty, turned off the light, and closed the door. Looking back, all those drills paid off because I did everything I was supposed to and it wasn't until I was in the CLC commons that I thought, wow, that was crazy," Andrew Russell, science teacher, said.

THE AFTERMATH
Students and staff returned to school on Oct. 7, which was the end of Quarter One. The boys and girls bathrooms in Technology Avenue were blocked off and had to be repaired. The student responsible for the incident was taken into custody and faced charges.
