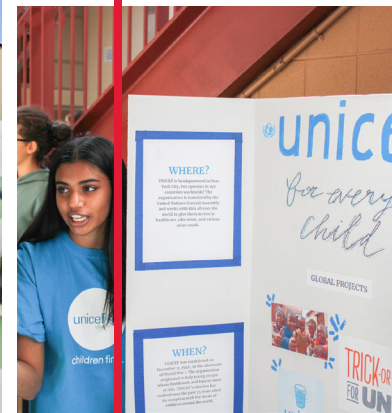
RELIANCE ON THE SCIENCE
