
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WHO THE STUDENTS WANT TO WIN THE SUPER BOWL

The Super Bowl is the most-watched sporting event in America, according to Bleacher Report. Each year, the best teams in the National Football League (NFL) all play to find out who is the champion. The four teams that made it to the Conference Championships were the Kansas City Chiefs, Cincinnati Bengals, Philadelphia Eagles and San Francisco 49ers.

According to a survey of 162 CV students, the team most predicted to win was the Kansas City Chiefs, getting 52 votes. The second favorite were the Cincinnati Bengals with 47 votes. 39 people voted for the San Francisco 49ers and, finally, 24 voted for the Philadelphia Eagles.

The two teams that competed in the 2023 Super Bowl were the Kansas City Chiefs and the Philadelphia Eagles. According to One37PM, the Chiefs are in the top ten teams with the most previous Super Bowl wins. They have won the Super Bowl twice before, once in 1969 against the Minnesota Vikings and the next time in 2019 against the San Francisco 49ers. In the previous survey, the least popular team people thought would win were the Philadelphia Eagles. As of Feb. 12, the Kansas City Chiefs are the Super Bowl LVII champions.
