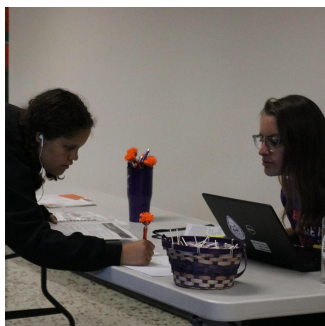

littleton partners with vitalant to host a blood drive



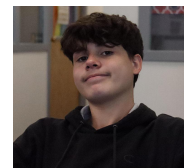

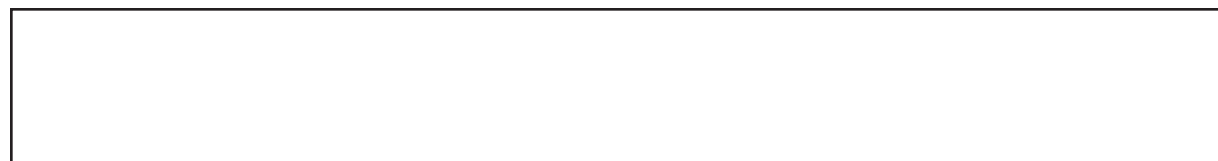
