Juniors are inducted into the IB Program, starting the long and difficult path ahead

"I love the tight-knit community we have within the school."

In early September, 63 students from the Class of '24 were inducted into the IB program, an internationally renowned diploma track. Other grades, meaning the IB seniors and the Pre-IB track freshmen and sophomores showed up to support them. The program, European based, was meant to rival the difficulty of college classes, and required service as well as sufficient academic performance to earn the diploma.

For those that chose to do it, IB took a lot of their time outside of school. Hamza H'mimy had been in IB programs since he was six, but still felt like the work load became too much at times. **"SOMETIMES I REGRET IT BECAUSE I FEEL LIKE THE WORK TAKES A LOT OF MY TIME, BUT OVERALL I THINK THE END IS GONNA MAKE IT WORTH IT,"** H'MIMY, said. The courses, while extremely tedious at times, gave students numerous credits so that many could begin their degrees as sophomores or juniors in college.

Unlike AP, IB offers classes that dig

more into the "why" of subjects they study, rather than just learning the content. Alongside 4 cores, 1 world language, and a sixth IB course in the subject of their choice, students were also required to take Theory of Knowledge, a class designed to make them think deeper about the world and the how knowledge is acquired. **"YD SAY THE BEST THING ABOUT IT IS BEING ABLE TO LOOK AT A BROADER SPECTRUM OF THINGS, AND NOT JUST LOOK AT ONE THING WHERE THERE'S ONE ANSWER,"** TAYLOR BROOKS said.

With such a small group of juniors, the new IB students formed a close community where everyone knew one another. They had classes with nearly all the same people, which made it easier to get comfortable and engage more with each other. **"IT'S NICE TO KNOW YOU HAVE A COMMUNITY AND JUST SEE THE SAME PEOPLE OVER AND OVER,"** THANH PHAM said. Many new friendships blossomed, and were able to stick due to this new community.
