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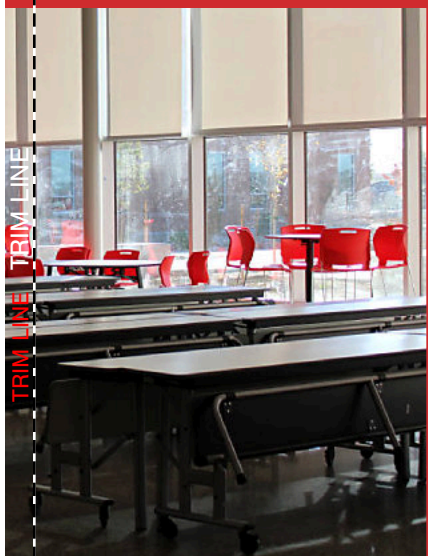
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START OF SOMETHING NEW

Eaton School District voters approved the \$128.5 million bond to pay for the new improvements to schools in our district and to build a new high school. They had also added the additional cost of \$1.5 million to support safety, mental health services, ongoing maintenance costs, and recruitment/retention of teachers and staff. After being in the old Eaton High School building for 113 years, high school students are getting a fresh start in a new building. Now having 177,000 square feet of building, the high school is prepared for larger class sizes in the future. Going from old architecture to something more modern and simple has made the town look new. The community has come together and welcomed the new high school with open arms. The "Start of Something New" features the new faces and new spaces of Eaton High School. Some of the new spaces include more lounge seating, restaurant like booths, and study carrels. Senior Autumn Hockley said, "I like the media center most because it is a nice space to hang out and do homework and there are actually comfy chairs to sit in." The year began with 181 freshmen, 139 sophomores, 131 juniors, 141 seniors, and 12 new staff. Students now have more areas to relax and hangout compared to the old Eaton High School.

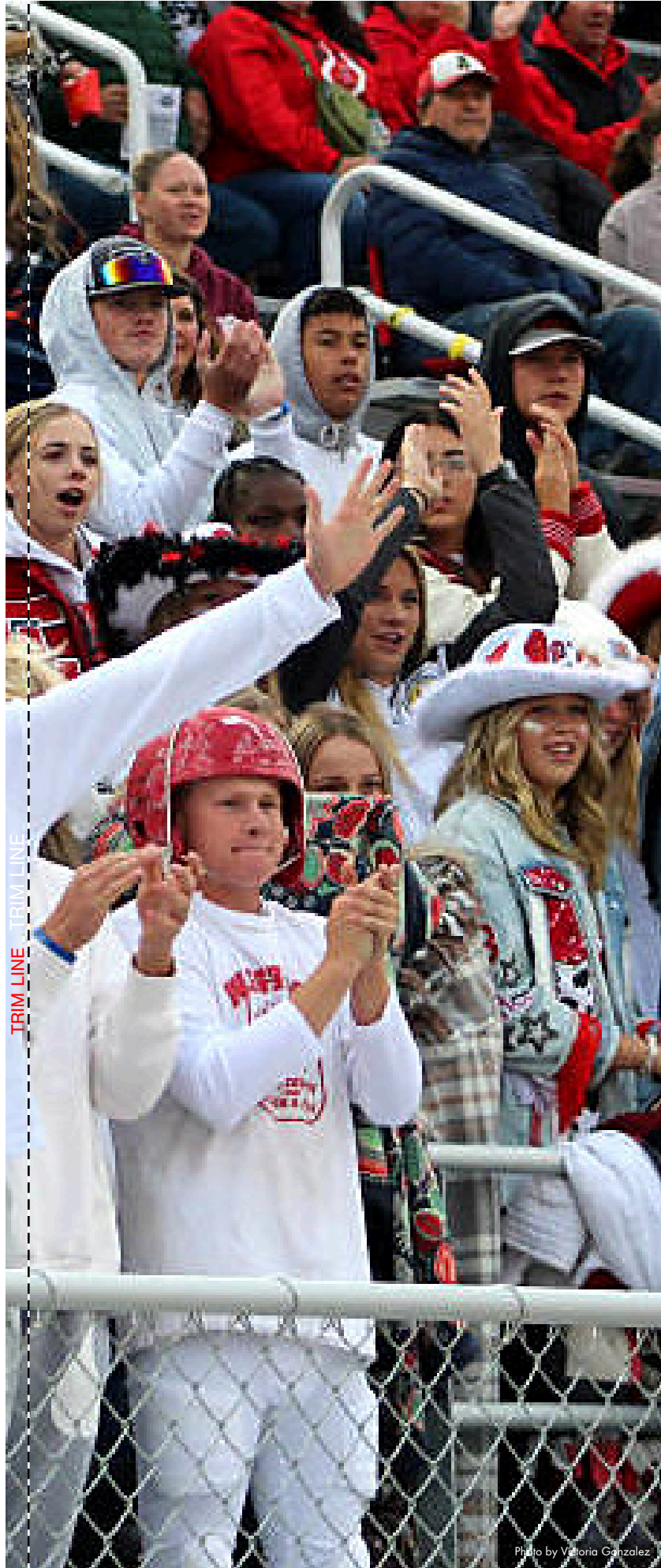
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FRESH SUPPORT

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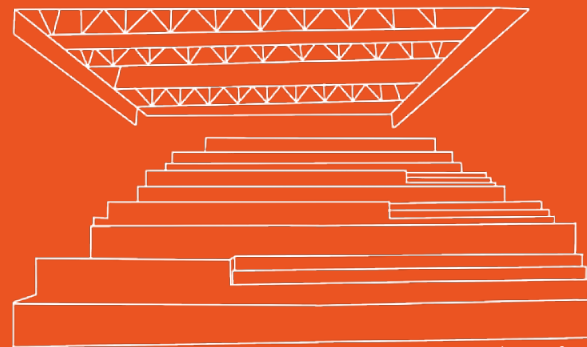
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WHAT ELSE IS NEW
