

CHSAA recognizes James Garcia for 30 year coaching career

WHO: James Garcia, assistant wrestling coach for boys wrestling and head coach for girls wrestling.

WHAT: The Colorado High School Activities Association (CHSAA) recognized Garcia among others for achieving a 30-year career of coaching wresting.

WHEN: Garcia's recognition came before the start of the State wrestling finals Feb. 18 on the Ball Arena floor.

FACT: Garcia graduated from Brighton and was a CHSAA Wrestling State champ in 1990.

THE FEELING: "It really meant a lot to get recognized at the State competition. A lot has happened over the years. I have watched some great men become State champs like Dylan [BravoPacker '23] and Kenny Sailas ['22]. We also just started a girls wrestling team. '23 wins second

After winning his division the previous year, BravoPacker became a two-time State champion after defeating Ponderosa's Adrian Arellano '25 in the heavyweight division.

BravoPacker beat all four of his opponents in the tournament in a total of 4:02. All were four first-round pins. He began the tournament defeating Arvada West's Braden Zack in 26 seconds. His quarterfinal match against Lakewood's Andrew Martinez lasted 1:11. He reached the finals pinning Centaurus' Xavier Valentin-Bradford in 43 seconds, the fastest pin in any 5A semifinal. He pinned Arellano to become the State champion in 1:42.

"It definitely has been a journey for me. Though I placed second my freshman and sophomore years at State, I was determined to win the title my junior year," BravoPacker said. "Just like last year, there was no

HEN IT CAME TO WINNING option to lose. It was all about coming into each match ready to dominate every opponent. It's what I did."

According to BravoPacker, he credited all of his coaches for preparing him for the competition.

"All of their words of encouragement stayed with me. I knew what I had to do," BravoPacker said. "The guys who got to go to State also helped because we all just supported one another those three days together."

Right before he went into his championship match, BravoPacker wore a T-shirt that said, "My grandson's wrestle. I brag." This shirt was dedicated to his grandfather, who passed away before the State tournament his freshman year as well as his two great-grandfathers.

"All of these men meant something to me. They were my mentors. They were my teachers. I will cherish my memories with them forever, so I wanted them there with me," BravoPacker said.
