
The anxiously awaited Wish Week Reveal took place at the wrestling competition

ONE wish is ALL it takes







The work of NAHS and sculpture students comes alive.



A A LITTLE BOY WHO LOVES DINOSAURS, **OCEAN ANIMALS, AND EXPLORING,"** said Braxton's mom, BRITNEY. On July 5,

2021, Braxton was diagnosed with B-cell Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia, which is a blood and bone marrow cancer. His diagnosis came from Britney noticing the appearance of bruises on his legs, as well as the frequent ear infections Braxton would get. "HE GOT SICK WITH A VIRAL INFECTION AND NEVER GOT BETTER. I TOOK HIM TO THE ER A BUNCH OF TIMES AND WAS ALWAYS SENT HOME. THEN FINALLY SOMEONE TOOK BLOOD WORK AND FOUND LEUKEMIA BLASTS," BRITNEY said. Their world had flipped upside down in an instant. So many unknown doors had opened up and it can be scary. Yet, Britney believes that God opens doors and shuts other for a reason and he never gives you more than you can handle.

One of the first things people think when they hear about cancer is the aggressive treatment that comes along with it. "(BRAXTON) TAKES DAILY CHEMO AT HOME IN PILL FORM AND EVERY THURSDAY HE TAKES SIX TOTAL CHEMO PILLS," she said. At diagnosis he had 31% cancer cells in his blood and 96.5% in his bone marrow. As of

Nov. 1, 2021, Britney is happy to report Braxton is in remission. This means there is no detection of cancer cells to the human eve.

For those who don't know, cancer patients can receive their treatments in wagons or hospital beds. Each wagon is made out of wood, making it uncomfortable and hospital beds require caregivers to pay constant attention to their children to make sure they don't fall off the bed. Britney found that using radio flyer wagons gave optimal comfort to Braxton as well as helped by making sure he stayed in one place during long appointments.
