As the Bald 4 Bucks Chair, Bastiaansen held a vital role in organizing the event and watching his hard work pay off. "So many people are dealing with so many hardships, and seeing the smiles on their faces of just pure joy [was my favorite part]... being able to shave your head or cut your hair for something so much bigger than yourself and use your hair as a symbol for your love, respect, and sympathy for people who are dealing with cancer was incredible."

Bastiaansen was also motivated by his own personal experiences with cancer in his family. "I got really emotional especially because I was sharing a big part of my story of what my family has been facing with my uncle who has dealt with leukemia and lymphoma, and just being able to put the event together and dedicate everything that I had done to him meant a lot to me and to my family, and to know that I was doing this to honor him." However, Bastiaansen was not the only one who participated in this news segment; Ryan Dean '23 also showed up to show his support for the LLS fundraiser. Dean has shaved his head for Bald 4 Bucks in the past, but said that doing it on the news made it a more unique experience.
