THE THESPIANS TAKE ON "THE LARAMIE PROJECT"

OCT. 3 - OCT. 16

Stepping away from light-hearted stories, "The Laramie Project" cast and crew took on the play's powerful, devastating story with empathy.

"The Laramie Project" told the story of Matthew Shepard, a University of Wyoming student who was killed in 1998 because of his sexuality. The play explored the aftermath of this horrific event and its effects on Laramie, Wyoming and the community beyond.

The powerful performance challenged and brought sentimental feelings to not only the

audience, but also the actors. "I love dramatic acting because it requires vulnerability with the audience. In order to portray huge emotions, you really have to put your whole self on stage. It's scary, but ultimately really exciting," **LUCIA GRAVES, 11**, said.

HOPE MILLS, 12, portrayed the father of Matthew Shepard. "I just wanted to do justice to the words he was saying and bring his character to life. However, it was one of the best experiences that I've had. I felt very supported by all of the cast and direction," Mills said.

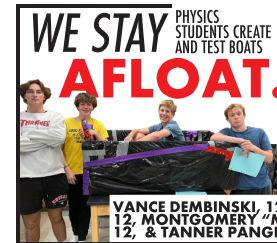
