Senior Tayla Wiedeman was the leading scorer throughout the season, putting up 14.2 points a game while shooting a team high of 49 percent from the field. She also contributed on the glass, putting up 6.0 rebounds a game. Not only did she make an impact on the offensive side of the ball, but she was a presence on the defensive end, finishing the season with 30 blocks. She played a huge
