

They have learned to pay close attention to the smaller things that make big differences in order to advance the game. "Our mindset went from having to make big plays into just having to convert on first downs. Instead of promising on the explosive plays we shifted our focus to getting on good streaks where we can just consistently put out yards," Mills said. 2. MAKE THE CHANGE. Charging through the Spartan's defense in the red zone, Cole Gaddis (12) trusts Kobi Derksen (12) to stay in front of him while running a trap run play. The talent of the team this season allowed for them to utilize all members offensively, especially in the run game. "Your team changes every year, so when you lose guys you really need to figure out what people to shape your identity around," Gaddis said. "I think we learned at the beginning of the season that we needed to find ways to have success in both the passing and running game and sometimes that means you're doing one better than the other in the given week.
