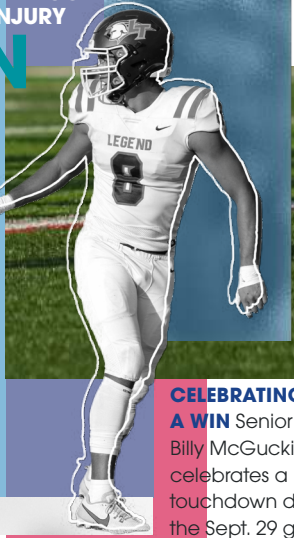


TOUGH SEASON
