Both competitions offer many competing events like creed speaking, employment skills, parlipro, vet science, ag sales, livestock judging, welding, floriculture, and many more. Competing in these events help FFA members prepare for a career in agriculture by testing and challenging the student's technical, leadership, interpersonal and teamwork skills as well as their knowledge of the subject matter. Students compete at district level, then qualify for state, and later to nationals if they win at state.

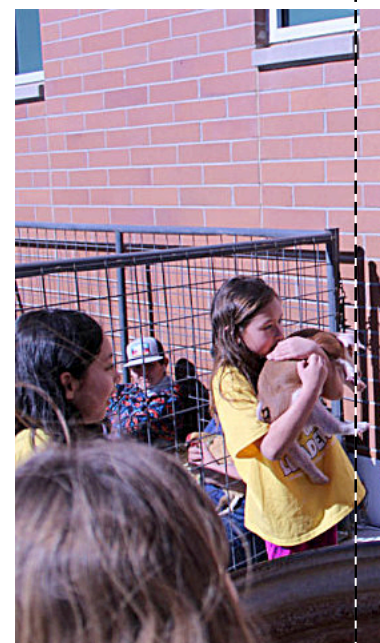
### ANNUAL FOOD DRIVE

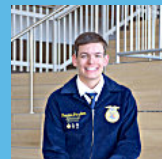
