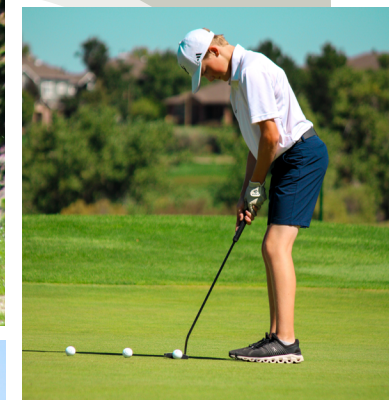
the highest temperature during the 18 hole tournament at the links golf course sept. 6

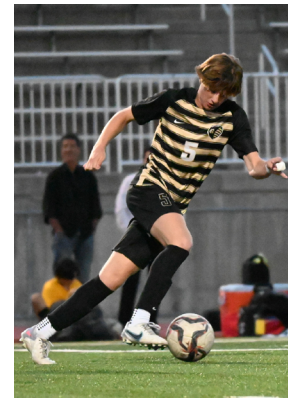
